## A Second Chance at Life: Helping Horses Heal in Georgia

Every day, countless horses across our communities suffer in silence—without proper food, clean water, safe shelter, or compassionate care. Many endure heartbreaking neglect and abuse. These animals, once strong and spirited, are left vulnerable and forgotten. But together, we can change that story.

At Georgia Equine Rescue League, our mission is simple yet powerful: to rescue, rehabilitate, and re-home horses in need. As a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization based in northern Georgia, with a network of dedicated volunteer coordinators throughout the state, we work tirelessly to be a voice for horses who cannot speak for themselves.

Every rescue tells a story. Most of the horses that arrive in our care are severely underweight—some even

emaciated—and require immediate and intensive support. Many have gone without basic necessities for far too long. Others carry emotional trauma from neglect

or mistreatment. Each horse that comes through our gates begins a journey of healing—one that requires time, patience, expertise, and significant financial resources.

The cost of proper equine care is substantial. On average, it takes between \$4,000 and \$10,000 or more per year to care for just one horse. This includes high-quality feed, veterinary care, farrier services, safe shelter, training, and rehabilitation. Beyond physical recovery, we

prioritize emotional healing—ensuring that each horse learns to trust again, to feel safe, and ultimately, to thrive.

# Cumberland Island, 2026

As of February 2026, the National Park Service is considering the development of a new park management plan for Cumberland Island, the protected maritime forest/barrier island off the coast of Georgia. This plan will address specifically Cumberland Island tourism.

In this considered new park management plan, there are some significant changes to the island. The most striking proposal is instead of allowing the ferries to bring 300 visitors per day, that number would increase to 700. The proposed plan would also build a shop and other facilities for visitors to the island, and it would allow for more motorized vehicles.

There are strong feelings “for” and “against” the proposed plan:

- Members of a wildlife advocacy group called Wild Cumberland, are concerned about this plan. They’re concerned that more people could disrupt the island’s natural elements. There is no funding or staffing plans to demonstrate or show they (the National Park Service) would be able to manage the increased numbers or handle the changes safely.
- Some people that are for the plan in St. Marys, the town where the ferries depart and return, say the increase would be great for business. They are welcoming the extra business and believe the extra visitors would not have a negative impact on the island's wildlife.
- With the increase of people, there are possibilities that more people that are “horse knowledgeable” or understand how horses thrive will see and understand what the isolated maritime forest’s impact is on these feral starving horses. Perhaps the additional visibility will help improve the struggling lives of the horses.

As is applies to the feral horses that struggle on this dense forest island, there needs to be a management plan that has never been put in place by the NPS to manage these horses. The Georgia Equine Rescue League will participate with a group/committee that is requesting that the National Park Service develop a management plan for the health and safety of the feral

equine population on the island.

We will provide more information as the team moves further through future meetings. Below is a link to a video that explains the situation of the Cumberland Feral Horses.

David gave Cowboy a new name — **Smoke** — which is pretty fitting for a handsome gray.

Now Smoke is living his best life on about 100 acres, helping move cows and checking fence lines with his new owner.

# What's Up With Breezy

It's been a little while since I last shared an update about Breezy, the little feral mare who joined the Georgia Equine Rescue League's (GERL) foster program back in August of 2024. She arrived alongside two young stallions, also feral. At the time, I certainly didn't expect them to stay this long—and I definitely didn't expect to become their trainer.

With many other priorities competing for attention, Breezy often ended up on the back burner. Over the past year and a half, I worked with her when I could. Despite those efforts, the moment I picked up a rope or halter, Breezy would slip straight into panic mode. Each time she was moved to a new paddock or pasture, it took her weeks to relax and feel comfortable again.

But through it all, Breezy has always shown her gentle nature. She's never offered to kick or bite—quite the opposite, in fact. She's a sweet mare with a soft demeanor and a quiet curiosity about the people around her.

Breezy is also a beautiful Palomino... although you might not know it at first glance. She absolutely loves mud and often keeps herself generously coated in it—sometimes with several layers for good measure. Even during the winter months, when bugs aren't a concern, she still enjoys her muddy spa treatments.

Recently, Breezy's pasture-mates—and her emotional security blankets—Airey and Tucker were moved into new homes. With the exception of my two horses, Breezy now finds herself on her own. Because of this, she's beginning to rely on me more than ever before.

These days, when I step into her paddock, Breezy often follows me around. She lets me brush her all over, even allowing me to handle her feet. Whenever I visit, she's usually waiting at the fence to greet me.

Now, it might just be the cookie she's hoping for—but I like to think it's more than that. Little by little, Breezy seems to be learning to trust... and maybe, just maybe, she's starting to form a bond with me.

For that reason, I contacted CeCe Calli and asked her to take Breezy off of our “adoptables” page for now. I feared that moving her now would certainly end badly.

Right now, we have 2 of these horses in our program. Tucker and Breezy brought into our program August 20, 2024. Feral is an understatement for these guys.

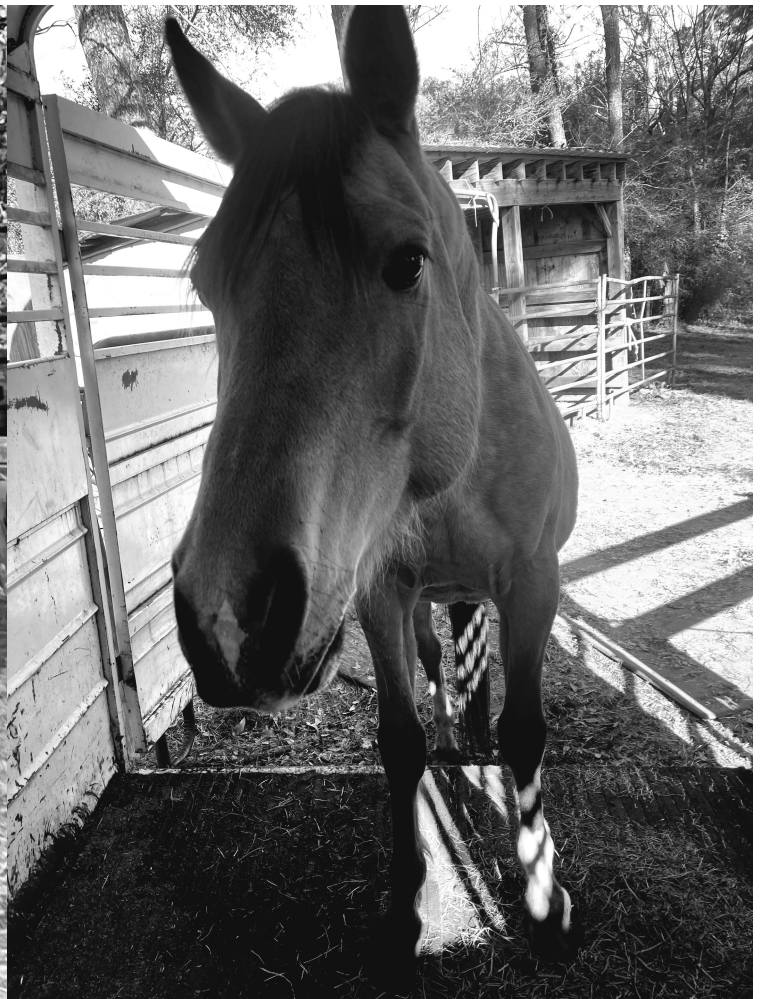

## Puttin' On The Feed Bag Recipe

### Stuffed Zucchini

#### Ingredients

- 3 medium zucchini
- 1 pound pork sausage
- 1 cup dry bread crumbs
- ½ cup grated Parmesan cheese
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1 (32 ounce) jar marinara sauce
- ½ cup shredded mozzarella cheese

#### Directions

**Step 1:** Gather all ingredients. Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). All ingredients gathered in various sized bowls

**Step 2:** Trim stems from zucchini and slice lengthwise. Scoop out seeds to create boats and place them in a large bowl. Add sausage, bread crumbs, Parmesan cheese, and garlic; mix to combine.

**Step 3:** Zucchini trimmed and prepped. Stuff zucchini boats with sausage mixture and arrange in a 9x13-inch baking pan. Pour spaghetti sauce over the top and cover with aluminum foil.

**Step 4:** Zucchini stuffed and topped with spaghetti sauce. Bake in the preheated oven until sausage is browned and cooked through, about 45 minutes. Remove foil and sprinkle with mozzarella cheese; continue to cook until cheese is melted, about 15 minutes more.

**Step 5:** Baked stuffed zucchini cooling on a wire rack

# The Animal Cruelty Database Registry

## Did You Know.....

I follow many different organizations and was happy to see a post from Georgia Pet Coalition announcing that on March 6, 2026, the Animal Cruelty Database registry bill (SB 587), sponsored by State Senator Shawn Still, passed the Georgia Senate 54-0! The bill provides for the establishment of an animal cruelty database, subject to appropriations, that will be created and administered by the Prosecuting Attorneys' Council of the State of Georgia and updated monthly.

The purpose of this free and publicly searchable database will be to assist animal shelters, animal protection and control agencies, and other organizations and members of the public involved in animal placement determinations in screening prospective owners and preventing animals from being placed in dangerous situations. And yes, it does apply to individuals convicted of abusing equines.

Those convicted of, or who plead guilty or nolo contendere to, the following offenses will be included in the database: Cruelty and aggravated cruelty to animals (O.C.G.A. 16-12-4), Dogfighting (O.C.G.A. 16-12-37), Bestiality (O.C.G.A. 16-6-6), Criminal trespass involv-

ing a wild animal (O.C.G.A. 16-7-21.2), and Interfering with, harming of, or aggravated harming of a public safety animal or search and rescue animal (O.C.G.A. 16-11-107). Note. Local ordinance violations will not appear in this registry.

SB 587 has been sent to the House side for consideration where additional amendments are possible. Should any amendments occur the bill will circle back to the Senate again for approval before advancing to the Governor for signature.

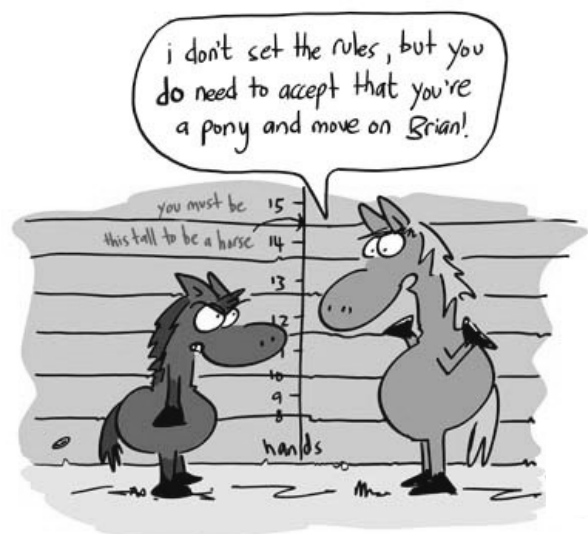

# LET ME SAY THIS...ABOUT THAT

My least favorite thing to do is ask for money. I've always believed that when people see meaningful work being done, they'll naturally want to support it—without being asked.

But today, I'm asking.

As I write this, the Georgia Equine Rescue League (GERL) is facing serious financial challenges. The truth is simple: the need for our programs is growing, while the support we rely on is shrinking.

Our membership is down—even though it costs just \$25 to join. That small annual contribution helps sustain programs that directly impact horses and the people who care for them across Georgia. It also keeps you connected to our mission through our quarterly newsletter and updates from the field.

At the same time, donations have declined. We are currently struggling to cover the costs of two of our most essential and widely used programs: Stallion to Gelding, which helps reduce overpopulation and improve horse welfare, and Feed a Horse, which provides critical support to the horses we rescue.

We are deeply grateful for our monthly supporters—they are the backbone of GERL—but the reality is that we need more people to step forward.

The program weighing heaviest on my heart right now is our Horses for Heroes initiative.

This program offers active-duty service members from Ft. Stewart a full day equine experience—an opportunity to step away from stress, reconnect with themselves, and experience the quiet, powerful healing that horses can provide. Since launching in 2023, I have witnessed something truly extraordinary: individuals arrive carrying burdens you cannot see, and leave lighter, calmer, and more connected.

There is a kind of magic in the presence of a horse. It doesn't judge. It doesn't rush. It simply meets you

where you are—and sometimes, that's exactly what a person needs to begin healing.

We are scheduled to return to Ft. Stewart the first week of June. The cost to make this program happen—facility leasing, horse use, feed, hay, etc. is approximately \$15,000. That investment allows us to serve 60 to 70 active-duty participants.

When you break that down, it's a small price for such a profound impact.

But we cannot do it alone.

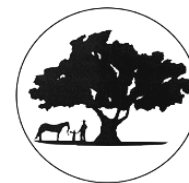

# Tucker vs the Tarp

Tucker arrived in Conyers on Valentine's Day. He stepped off the trailer and walked to a flake of hay and started eating. A nice start. I just spent time with him for the rest of the day. I wanted him to bond with me. Food sharing is a way to increase oxytocin levels. I taught him to touch my fist with his nose. I use the cue "touch" with my arm extended. When he touches my fist, I gave him a slice of carrot. I also sat near him while he ate. I also sat with him when he was not eating and just relaxed.

The next few days I taught him to face me and give me 2 eyes. This is the answer to most questions I ask him. I tried not to put him into flight mode. When I brought a halter into the pen, his panic was obvious. So, I hung the halter on the fence and moved away. I gathered other objects to see what he thought of them. I wanted to encourage curiosity. I added dog toys to his pen. He did not like rope toys. So I added them to the fence. I added pool noodles to the pen. He snorted and trotted away. But I got his feet to stop and 2 eyes. I watched him from the house. He investigated each object. As we worked together, his response improved. I added a tarp to his pen. I expected snorting and movement. He walked up to the tarp and sniffed it. He was not worried. Each day I moved his toys around.

The other thing we practiced every day was back. I gave a hand signal and a verbal cue. He picked it up quickly. I realized that he did not want me to touch him. I stopped trying to touch him and he seemed to relax. On day thirty I decided to challenge him. I went to each object in his pen. I picked up the first toy. I banged it on the fence. He stood quietly and gave me 2 eyes. I dropped the toy and moved to the next object—a halter. I untied it and swung it around. He paced around. I continued until he gave me the right answer. He stopped and gave me 2 eyes. The next challenge was the tarp. I unfolded it and swung it around. I still had 2 eyes. I slapped it on the fence and ground. I still had 2 eyes. I dropped the tarp and moved on. I picked up the jolly ball and threw it on the ground. No response. The next object was a halter and lead rope. I was able to slap it on the fence and ground. He moved around a bit but stopped and gave me 2 eyes. I went and sat in my chair. After a rest, I got out the flag. He moved away from me and snorted. I moved the flag

back and forth and waited. About 30 seconds later he stopped. I dropped the flag. I went to sit down and Tucker joined me.



Tucker is teaching me patience. I am learning to train without touching him. We are on a journey that is new to both of us. My training goals change and grow. I want a partnership. Touch will happen on Tucker time. I will get a halter on him on Tucker time. Training will take as long as it needs to take. I don't want a fearful horse. I want a curious and willing horse. I want to thank the GERL for the opportunity to work with Tucker.

# Road to the Horse Review

Road to the Horse is a premier four-day colt-starting competition where trainers turn untouched 3-year-old horses into rideable companion using natural horsemanship.

*The aim is to create a partnership built on trust, demonstrated by a calm, willing mount, not just a broken one.*

The event emphasizes building trust, with scoring based on groundwork, saddling, and obstacle navigation over several rounds, prioritizing connection over speed. Judges look for a partnership where the horse is not fearful and focusing on the trainer's effectiveness in communication. The event brings in top trainers who display their ability to create a safe riding companion in a very short time frame.

This year my husband (Chet) and I went to this event for our second time with hopefully many more to come. It delivered as it did the first time. We arrived on Thursday and returned home late Sunday. It was so amazing to witness all the incredible talent and dedication. The competitors began with a Wild Card competition as the winner went on to the championship competition to join three other competitors. There were four in total. The competition was

much closer than the prior event we attended. The talent of these experts was unimaginable. Not just because they were talented trainers, because they knew how to connect with these horse that they chose from, the untrained or touched 12 horses that were brought in from Three Forks Ranch in Texas. The horses didn't have to respond with fear, they willingly worked with their trainer because of the way they were handled and calmed after travel across the country from Texas.

After they spent time in the round pen the first few days, they faced a mind-boggling field of obstacles, that seem to get tougher every year. The four competitors were scored by judges each day, and in the final course of achieving each obstacle. The winner is decided by the highest score of all four days. Each competitor regardless of the score was unbelievable in their own unique way of achieving the final goal intended. They were professionals, soft but tough, their wisdom and why they did what they did was so enjoyable to take in. While each was working in the individual competition, they had headsets on to talk to the crowd (part of scoring) to explain their thoughts, what and why they were doing certain things with the horse.

One presenter (Buster McCleary) was doing a demonstration on preparing a colt in the round pen and stated, “A horse is a prey animal, and we are predators. It is interesting how you put a horse in a round pen and chase after them, with a scary instrument. Not an efficient way to connection.” Something to think about.

We learned so much from each trainer. We were in disbelief not with just the trainers selected to compete, but by the entertainment throughout the event. I have provided codes below that you can scan or links you can search to see the competitors and all the beautiful, talented performances. It’s a must-see event, at least once if you have or simply enjoy horses. If you go once, you might get hooked. The knowledge obtained and all you will learn about how horses should be handled and trained it worth the trip. You are among fans that all have one thing in common.....THE HORSE.
